

HCV Reflex at Labs

Summary

What is known about this topic?

Current hepatitis C virus (HCV) testing guidance recommends a two-step testing sequence for diagnosis of HCV infection. When an HCV antibody test is reactive and no HCV RNA test is performed, testing is considered incomplete. Historically, approximately one third of patients have incomplete testing.

What is added by this report?

New guidance for completion of HCV testing supports operational strategies that collect samples at a single visit, and automatic HCV RNA testing on all HCV antibody reactive samples. Use of strategies that require multiple visits to collect samples should be discontinued.

What are the implications for public health practice?

Automatic HCV RNA testing on all HCV antibody reactive samples will increase the percentage of patients with current HCV infection who are linked to care and receive curative antiviral therapy.



Hep Free Hawai'i, the Hawai'i State Department of Health, Seafarers Medical Clinic (SMC), and Kaiser Permanente partnered to provide on-site HBV education, screening, and appropriate follow-up (vaccinations, referral to in-country treatment) to fishermen in

The purpose of this project is to analyze and assess the prevalence of HBV within SMC patient population and provide culturally competent Hepatitis B and vaccine education to the longline fishermen of Hawai'

In September 2022, 83 participants were recruited from SMC's patient population. Participants' blood samples were collected and screened for HBV using the following tests: hepatitis B surface antigen (HBsAg), hepatitis B surface antibody (anti-HBs), and hepatitis B core antibody



Figure 1: Flow chart for obtaining Patient Consent

Patient intake began with an understanding of their demographic information and an introduction to the study. The patient then signed a Consent Form, a Patient Demographic Form, and a DLS Form to demonstrate their understanding and consent. Then, the patient's blood was drawn and sent to a Diagnostic Lab Services for screening for Hepatitis B. The blood test results was then analyzed, and the patient received follow-up care depending on the results.



A total of 84 fishermen participated. All participants identified as male, with 16 originating from Vietnam, 43 from Indonesia, and 24 from the Philippines. Among those tested, there was an HBsAg positivity of 2.4% (2/84)




Figure 2: Patient Demographics.

39.8%(33/83) had prior exposure or immunity. Regarding completing the 2-dose HBV vaccine series, 32 received Dose 1, and 23 received Dose 2. Fourteen participants either declined the vaccination or moved back to their home country before receiving follow-up




Figure 4: %(Initial Dose) Vaccine Compliance per Figure 5: % Vaccine Series Compliance per

Participants with positive HBsAg were offered a hepatic function panel test, including ALT, AST, bilirubin, and prothrombin time. Those with both negative HBsAg and anti-HBc results were offered HBV vaccination, while those with negative HBsAg results and positive anti-HBc results were offered education on maintaining HBV-free

Our findings revealed unexpectedly low HBsAg positivity among the fishermen, Among this patient population, there was high vaccination compliance. Translators were present who were proficient in the participants native languages and played a pivotal role in delivering education regarding hepatitis and vaccinations. This underscores the significant role of translator liaisons in facilitating patient care in non-English speaking communities. Some noteworthy challenges arose due to unique work schedules requiring frequent voyages at sea. This posed a hurdle in providing continuity of care for fishermen to receive follow-up and additional vaccine doses.

- Difficulty executing Follow-ups due to conflict with Fishermen's work
- Limited availability of Vietnamese, Filipino Liaison during recruitment and follow-up execution






